



Rationale

Templemoor Infant and Nursery School recognises that all pupils, regardless of background, should have equal access to a curriculum which will enable them to reach their potential. The Pupil Premium is a government initiative that targets extra money to pupils from deprived backgrounds that, as research shows, underachieve compared to their peers.

The government has used pupils entitled to Free School Meals as an indicator for deprivation, and have deployed a fixed amount of money to schools per pupil, based on the number of pupils eligible for Free School Meals. Children who are Looked After or the children of armed service personnel are also eligible for this increased funding.

The government is not dictating how schools should spend this money, but are clear that schools will need to employ the strategies that they know will support these pupils to increase their attainment, and 'narrow the gap' between their attainment and the attainment of other pupils.

Templemoor Infant and Nursery School Pupil Premium Funding Expenditure 2013/14

All schools received the following funding for each eligible child in 2013-14:

- £900 for pupils registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years.
- £300 for pupils registered as a Service Child in the last 4 years.
- £900 for pupils registered as being adopted from care.

Year 1 data:

In the 2014 Y1 phonics screening, 100% of children in receipt of the PPF achieved the required level. This exceeded the national average of 63% by 37%.

Year 2 data:

In the 2014 Y2 phonics screening, 100% of children retaking the phonics screening who were in receipt of PPF achieved the required level. This exceeded the national average of 60% by 40%.

In Year 2 the percentage of children in receipt of Pupil Premium funding achieving L2+:

- Reading 100%
- Writing 67%
- Mathematics 100%

In mathematics lessons more time has been given within lessons in Year 2 than previously. Pupils have been grouped according to their ability and additional teaching has been provided using an RM Maths package which targeted pupils.

The Pupil Premium funding received by Templemoor Infant and Nursery School in 2014/15 is **£18100**.

The PPG allocation for 2014/2015 will be targeted to:

- Employ a Pupil Premium Coordinator who will provide additional support for all Pupil Premium children for 1.5 days/ week.



- Provide additional TA interventions / catch up groups in basic skills in EYFS to improve levels of attainment, particularly in writing, reading and number. Provide suitable resources to support these interventions.
- Provide additional TA time to provide one to one support with basic literacy (particularly writing) and numeracy skills in Key Stage 1.
- Purchase computing hardware and software to motivate children and enable them to achieve differentiated targets.
- Support access to breakfast club, and after school clubs to build confidence and self-esteem.
- The funding of school trips/ visitors to school.
- Provision of a lunchtime sports club.
- Provision of free places at the lunchtime recorder clubs (Year 2)
