

#### Rationale

Templemoor Infant and Nursery School recognises that all pupils, regardless of background, should have equal access to a curriculum which will enable them to reach their potential. The Pupil Premium is a government initiative that targets extra money to pupils from deprived backgrounds that, as research shows, underachieve compared to their peers.

The government has used pupils entitled to Free School Meals as an indicator for deprivation, and have deployed a fixed amount of money to schools per pupil, based on the number of pupils eligible for Free School Meals. Children who are Looked After or the children of armed service personnel are also eligible for this increased funding.

The government is not dictating how schools should spend this money, but are clear that schools will need to employ the strategies that they know will support these pupils to increase their attainment, and 'narrow the gap' between their attainment and the attainment of other pupils.

Both Pupil Premium children did not achieve a Good Level of Development. Both children had targeted support from a teaching assistant to develop social skills and for daily speech and language work. One child joined us during the Summer term. One child was EAL (English as an additional language) and one child was ethnic minority. Despite this, and in response to interventions, they reached the expected level in some but not all of the 17 ELGs.

Of the 3 children who didn't pass the phonics test, the scores were 11, 28 and 31 out of 32 needed to pass the test. All four Pupil Premium children had focussed one to one phonic support sessions from a teaching assistant and HLTA. They are continuing to receive targeted intervention in Year 2
