Spotlight On: TASC - Trafford's Autism and Social Communication Pathway

Here in Trafford we have developed a new Trafford Autism and Social Communication (TASC) pathway.

We wanted to shine a 'Spotlight On' the pathway in this article as part of improving our communications to families.

We attended a Trafford Parents Forum event on Thursday 7 February 2019 at the Sale Life Centre to listen to the concerns of families and give out further information.

We took away your comments from this event to help us ensure this new pathway will be the right pathway for Trafford families.

From Old to New

TASC replaces the old pathway which you might have heard called the Neuro Development Pathway, or ND Pathway. This old pathway was no longer working for the families of Trafford.

It was taking far too long for families to get a formal diagnosis, as the old pathway was underfunded. This led to a backlog of children and young people on the waiting list.

So, at a time when you, as parent carers, have been most in need of support, it was not always there.

We want to apologise for this and we want to put it right.

Fixing this for families

We are doing two major things to make sure that children are diagnosed and families are supported as quickly as possible. First, we are working to clear the backlog. Second, we have introduced the TASC pathway.

There is currently a waiting list of around 240 children. If you are on this waiting list, you will receive a letter from us at the end of this month. We are pleased to say that we have secured some extra funding to help us employ more staff and look at additional places for assessments to take place.

All this will take some time, but we ask families to bear with us. We will be working through the waiting list in the order that the referral was originally received. Many children will have been seen by September and the vast majority of the backlog will be cleared by December.

We know there has been some confusion about the period between the pathways. At the end of last year some families had been told that the old ND pathway was closed and that the new TASC pathway was not yet open.

Spotlight On: TASC - Trafford's Autism and Social Communication Pathway

This caused understandable concern for families thinking they could not access any pathway to diagnosis following the end of the out-of-date ND pathway. Whilst this was down to miscommunication, we know that we should have acted quicker to clarify and hope this will clear up any confusion.

There had been some delay in providing training to SENCOs, meaning there was a period between October and December where the old pathway had stopped accepting referrals but SENCOs were still being trained on the new pathway.

We want to clarify that the TASC pathway was open during that time and the decision was made to have families join this new pathway. Whilst there was some delay until all the SENCOs were ready, it was still quicker for families to join TASC rather than join the old pathway at that stage.

What is the TASC Pathway?

The new TASC pathway brings significant improvements for families in Trafford.

It allows a plan to be put in place straight away to meet the child or young person's needs without requiring a formal diagnosis.



It is part of a wider Greater Manchester initiative and Trafford is one of the first areas to implement this.

If you have concerns about your child's social communication needs you should first speak to the Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCO) at your child's school or nursery. They can help develop a plan which will include using agreed strategies to support your child or young person straight away. The plan will typically be put in place for around 2 school terms, with regular reviews.

We are asking families to speak with their SENCO in the first instance because this is the person who is best placed to implement immediate support for your child or young person. Please be assured that your SENCO is not going act as a gatekeeper.

If your child is not in education or is home educated you should speak to your GP instead in the first instance.

If your child is not yet in school or nursery you should speak to your Health Visitor.

Spotlight On: TASC - Trafford's Autism and Social Communication Pathway

If there are still concerns after support has been put in place for 2 terms your SENCO can make a referral to the Trafford Autism and Social Communication (TASC) team.

The referral can also include supporting advice from a specialist such as an Educational or Clinical Psychologist, a Speech Therapist or a Community Paediatrician.

Once a child or young person is accepted on to the TASC pathway, an Assessment Action Plan will be made to work out the next steps. Following this an assessment will take place.

Children who are not in school or whose needs do not present in school or at an early years provider

One of the first stages of support may include an Early Help Assessment. This should be completed with you by a professional who knows your child's needs best. This is useful where you are facing multiple challenges as a family, or where your child's needs are not presenting themselves at school or nursery.

SENCOs have been trained to not dismiss parent carer concerns if their child's needs are not presenting at their school or early years provider. If your child is already being seen by a Paediatrician, Speech and Language Therapist (or other professional) and concerns about social communication or autism are raised, then that professional should seek consent from you to contact a SENCO.

If a school is refusing to provide interventions, then another professional can make a referral to TASC for advice. Someone in TASC can also contact the school to discuss the issues but they will need your consent to do so.

Advice and Guidance

The **Information Advice and Support** (IAS) **Programme** is a national government initiative that started in June 2018.

The programme seeks to ensure that in every area children and young people with SEND and their parents/carers have access to impartial and free information, advice and support. It is made up of several strands:

New Minimum standards for all IAS services in England. In Trafford the IAS service is called Trafford Parent and Young Peoples Partnership.

They are expected to ensure the service is meeting these minimum standards and Ofsted will review this when they undertake their SEND Area inspections.

The <u>National Minimum Standards</u> have been published.

An <u>easy read version of the</u> <u>standards</u> is available.

Additional Funding to review what impartial and free information, advice

and support is currently offered in a local authority, and for planning to seek improvements over time.

Trafford PYPPS has been successful in their bid for 2019/2020 and will be looking to improve the information they produce on their website and on social media.

We will be also setting up a Steering Group, or advisory body, which will include representatives from service user groups such as parents, young people and representatives from education, social care and health. They will be monitoring the minimum standards to make sure they are being met and helping develop the service.

We are also going to look at developing the service for post 16 young people, as an EHC Plan can now cover up to 25 years old.

We will give further updates on our progress with this in future newsletters and on our website / social media platforms.

Our SEN consultants offer advice to school staff in their specialist areas. Here you can meet our SEN Consultant in Autism and Social Communication. Take it away, Jackie!

"I started work in Trafford in September 2017 and thanks to the welcome I have had from my colleagues, the schools, and the families I have met I already feel really settled.

Before I came to Trafford, I was a teacher in another borough for a large number of years (not going to say how many!)

Firstly I worked in Mainstream Primary schools, and then in a Specialist School for autistic pupils. For the last 5 or so years, I worked as the school's Outreach Lead Teacher. For many years I have been really passionate about working with schools to help them to include the autistic pupils in their care, so this really is my dream job.

My days are really varied! I can be attending an annual review, observing children and giving advice to their teachers, then delivering after school training to staff all in the same day. I am trying to send emails to schools telling them about regular autism friendly events they can pass on to families.

I still have an awful lot to learn - I am new to Trafford so am still trying to learn how everything works so I can help schools to support autistic children and young people.

I am sure I will meet a number of you at different events - perhaps at something for <u>World Autism Awareness Week,</u> which runs from 1-7 April this year!"

Trafford Short Breaks

The Short Break offer is for children aged five to 18 years old. The short breaks provide a fun and social environment for them whilst giving their parent carers some respite from their caring role.

Currently Sport Works provides this service for five to 11 year olds and Together Trust provide the service for 11 to 18 year olds.

Sessions are run on a weekend during term time and on some weekdays during school holidays.

For eligible families these sessions are free and are accessed through an <u>online application form</u>.

Empower You

A new service for people with learning impairments and Autism in Trafford.

Empower You supports people with learning impairments, intellectual impairments and Autism to lead healthy, active lives.

Empower You offers eight to twelve weeks of support to groups of people with learning impairments, intellectual impairments and Autism to engage with any activity within their locality; anything from walking and gardening groups to intensive gym workouts. It does this by grouping people based on their interests.

It also works with those around the person such as carers, family, friends and support staff as 'buddies' to increase their awareness and confidence in supporting physical activity.

At the same time, Empower You upskills local activity providers, offering accredited training to increase their confidence in supporting disabled people in the activity they provide.

In doing so, Empower You creates a community in which disabled people have the opportunity and knowledgeable support in place, to maintain activity levels beyond Empower You.

To date, 70% of those engaged with Empower You have maintained their activity levels beyond the initial intensive phase of the intervention.

Empower You has been developed over a ten-year period and piloted over the past four years, recently being commissioned by Trafford Council.

Empower You is for people with learning and intellectual impairments and Autism. Empower You is delivered across Trafford.

Empower You is run by Ben Andrews, Project Manager at Unlimited Potential.

Those referred must have a learning impairment, intellectual impairment or Autism and live in the Trafford area.

Green Academies Project (GAP)

National Trust Volunteering in Partington

The Green Academies Project (GAP) is working with young people aged 11-24 in Partington getting them closer to nature, learning environmental conservation skills and having fun through social action! We run taster sessions for interested groups as well as regular youth volunteering activities.

Urban Rangers, Partington

Youth Rangers, Dunham Massey

The Green Academies Project (GAP) is a National Trust project funded by The National Lottery Community Fund through the Our Bright Future Programme. The aim of the project is to get more young people aged 11-24 practically involved in their local green spaces.

At Dunham Massey and in Partington, GAP offers young people the chance to gain practical conservation skills and experience in habitat conservation, food growing and horticulture in local green spaces alongside experienced and qualified rangers. The aim of this is to create a positive and sustainable community, through creating partnerships with the organisations based in Partington as well as the residents of the community.

Outcomes: Through this project at Dunham Massey there have been many positive outcomes including over 300 young people engaging in the projects program, largely across Partington.

The Ranger and Coordinator of the GAP program at Dunham Massey have made excellent partnerships with organisations in the local area including High-Functioning Trafford, Autistic Society Greater Manchester Area, Postive Partington, bluSCI and many more.

All of these organisations touch the lives of young people in Partington and gives the program its best chance to reach out to as many young people as possible.

George, aged 13, is one of our regular GAP volunteers: *"I feel I have more confidence and it has stopped me feeling stressed when I go out in my community".*

Learning: The Green Academies Project has helped young people in the area develop their skills and work ethic

into skills that they require to become employable and have helped them gain employment and further education when they have finished school or college.

Future: The Green Academies Project team are thinking a lot about how the opportunities for young people they've created can transition into business as usual in the future for the National Trust and are working with Dunham Massey and local partners to achieve a shared vision.

The team want to expand their partnerships to reach more young people, share skillsets and contacts with other partners, to embed the GAP program in property plans at Dunham Massey, and hope that there is a way to link the project to the National Curriculum to get a larger amount of students involved in their school time.

Get Involved: We welcome young people and community volunteers from all backgrounds and skill sets.

Just launched is our new Garden Club run by the National Trust Garden Team from Dunham Massey. They meet every Tuesday at the Library & Wellbeing Centre garden in Partington 11-12pm. Using our expertise, we are also supporting Your Housing Group, the landowners of Redbook Trail in Partington with our Redbook Revive. The Redbrook Trail is a 5.8 acre site with 650 metres of pedestrian paths through beautiful stretches of woodland with areas of wildflower and is home to a wide variety of birds and mammals.

The work, which is being undertaken predominately by volunteers including school children and members of the community, has included clearing pathways, restoring signage and information boards, and litter picking.

Included in our plans is the restoration of an accessible path and we have recently applied to the Partington Moving fund to get financial support to create an orienteering route in conjunction with British Orienteering, and the National Trust's Active Outdoors Team for ages 5+ along the trail including sensory boxes and nature signage.

Autism Friendly Sessions at Manchester Museums

In the run up to World Autism Awareness Week, Jackie (see page 7) has pulled together the following information about autism friendly sessions at the ever popular Manchester Museums.

World Autism Awareness Week Monday 1 April to Sunday 7 April 2019

Open Doors

Manchester Art Gallery

Since 2014 Manchester Art Gallery has been holding monthly autism friendly sessions on a Saturday morning aimed at children with autism and their families.
